Building 1: Dining Hall; Tables for breakfast, lunch, hot and cold drinks, sale items, large stationary steam engine.

Building 2: Association Office; Logo apparel, covered seating for main viewing area, sale items.

Building 3: Anderson Building; Antique machinery and storage building.

Building 4: <u>Repair Shop</u>; Used for restoration and repair of antique farm equipment.

Building 5: <u>Craft Fair;</u> Vendors, train depot, antique tools, bank vault door, Dr. Pecks buggy, pedal toys, antique wagons.

Building 6: <u>Wright Building</u>; Antique tractors, implements, and storage.

Building 7: Thompson Building; Car and truck museum, antique signs and license plates.

Building 8: Eggers Building: Historical crafts, pioneer rooms, player piano, vintage clothing, beauty shop.

Building 9: Blacksmith Shop: Working blacksmith demonstrating metal fabrication, bending and how to temper steel.

Building 10: Creamery: Antique milking machine, cream separator and dairy related items.

Building 11: <u>Bacon Building</u>: Steam engine shop, steam engines, rare caterpillar– holt combine, Prony brake, baker fan, dynamometer.

Building 12: Quilt Shop; Beautiful hand sewn quilts by locals, a display of baby quilts. Print Shop; Linotype Press, demonstration on how printing was done and an opportunity to print your own post cards.

Building 14: Dorsch-Sawyer Building; Tractor museum, rare and unusual antique tractors and implements.

Building 15: Brubaker Building; Threshing machine, antique tractors and implements and storage area.

Building 16: <u>Wilkens Building</u>; Featuring Diamond "T" Trucks, pickups and fire trucks, antique tractors, crawlers, signs, and over 100 pedal toys.

Building 17: <u>Clark Building</u>; Permanent tractor pulling exhibit, over 400 toy tractors, miniature farm, popcorn wagon, water wagon and interesting items.

Sod House: Built in 1985, it provides everyone an opportunity to see how the early homesteaders provided shelter for their families.

School House: Highland school house used to be located about nine miles southwest of St. Francis, free activities for kids take place everyday during the show.

<u>Country Church:</u> Neville Methodist Episcopal Church was chartered on March 18, 1910 and remained in operation until 1983, donated to the association on 1984, it provides an excellent example of a rural church.

Cook Shack: Example of how the ladies fed the large groups of men required for threshing.

Railroad Caboose: A great place for kids to have a fun time!
