Calliope and Steam Engine History By Carl Bergman

My interest in steam started in the year 1970 when a friend told me about a steam engine from the silver mining era of 1879 which had been abandoned on Independence Pass above the Ghost Town of "Independence". Back in 1878, Leadville had discovered silver and miners were eagerly mining and creating fortunes. Word came that silver had been discovered in Aspen and some of these miners crossed



Independence Pass with mules, tools, etc. to take advantage of this new "strike". We brought this engine down to Aspen to be refurbished.


We removed the 24 tubes, contacted a boiler company in Denver and had new ones installed. It was tested by the State of Colorado Boiler Inspector and has been inspected and licensed ever since. It is name the Catherine Marie, after my wife.

In 1974 as I was having coffee with a friend from eastern Colorado, he told me about a gas/steam show just over the border into Kansas, and I was very interested. My father from Indiana was coming out to visit so we planned to attend. I took my dad, my son, Bob, and his friend, David Woodward, to the Roy Kite Farm. We spent the entire day there, checking out everything, having fun and talking with all of the participants, not just attenders. A year or so later, we had acquired six hit and miss engines and my son and some of his friends (in grade school at that time) took these engines to Bird City, KS to be a part of the action. In those days, we tented and used the pool/showers there. A fun experience!

Then in the year 1977, "Live Steam" magazine had a full page picture of a steam calliope on the cover which caught my attention immediately. The tie in with the steam engine was obvious. We had the power source and it looked like a sure thing. I sent for the plans and set up to build the calliope from scratch. As it turns out, it took us a full year of off and on spurts to get the brass metal for the 10 whistles, to make the pipe manifold, and all of the details worked out. As it turns out, our neighbor was still cutting out the wooden keys the morning of the first 4^{th} of July Parade we participated in. Only 6 out of the 10 whistles worked, but we were thrilled that it worked! We have never missed a 4^{th} of July Parade since and our friend, Jim Jenkins, played for us for 30 years. He even flew over to Bird City a number of years and played for us there. Now the Bergman boys are playing! Jim has passed on. The calliope is name Patricia Jane, after our dear friend.

Another important segment must be mentioned as well. Ken Beougher of Bird City, has let us use his 1934 John Deer D tractor to pull the rig for all of the show parades. Tim Beougher and Ken refurbished the JD and it could not look better for the shows. And more, Sharon Beougher, Tim's wife, took time from all she does to write special music for our 10-key calliope, even enabling harmonious chords! Over the years, our son and grandsons have developed improvements to the whole set up. Our team at present: Grandson Justin Bergman, Calliope Player; Grandson Daniel Bergman, Tractor Driver; Son Bob Bergman, Calliope Tuner; and yours truly, Carl Bergman, Fireman.

The calliope is an on-going affair with many people involved. We hope many future generations will keep her tooting!

HERE WE GO AGAIN • STEAM ENGINE NEWS By: Gerald Wright, Boiler Inspector

On Friday, March 13th, Lloyd Stover from Pueblo, CO, and I, left for the March 14th KAESSA safety show meeting at the Kansas Fly Wheelers in Salina, KS. Our Avery Undermount operator from Olathe, KS, Mike Levin, joined us for the night. Randall Neff and son Riley, joined us for breakfast before the meeting.

Discussion got quite heated when the 5 to 1 ratio was brought up. No decision was finalized on this ration problem we have here. Our boilers were built with a 4 to 1 ratio, and if this was implemented, our boiler pressures would be reduced to a none operative condition on some engines.

Then 100 PSI for all lap seam boilers was brought up. Then the heat was on. Looking back through the archives of minutes, nothing could be found as this "hear say" was conformed to be hog wash. Lap seam boilers should be checked and rated for pressure as any boiler using the boiler codes for lap seam boilers.

The men from Missouri that repair/build boilers were present and gave us a lot of input and information on boiler laws and had a computer presentation on boiler building. This is very hard hot work, forming 3/8 and 1/2 inch sheet metal over rounded curved forms.

Another problem was encountered after the retiring of Donald Jenkins, Kansas State Boiler Inspector and his secretary. The new recruits didn't recognize us as legitimate Kansas Antique Engine Safety Show Association. Many thanks to Cliff, as he forced his way past the new secretary to see the new Kansas boiler inspector to show him the law, things got cleared up real fast.

Officers: President - Ted Housa (Salina, KS), Vice-President - Craig Shilks (Missouri), newly elected Secretary/ Treasurer - Brad Smith (Jamestown, KS). After 12 years as Secretary/Treasurer, Cliff Silsby retired.
